I GENERAL MEDIA INFORMATION

Welcome to the 7th DELO EHF FINAL4 in Budapest. Through the media information services we will keep you up to date with all news and provide resources for your coverage including the access to virtual media call, mixed zone and press conference.

General media information

Accreditations – You can pick up your accreditation in the Danubius Hotel Arena (Ifjúság útja 1-3, 1148 Budapest; next to the Papp László Budapest Sportaréna). Opening hours of the accreditation centre are:

- Friday, 28 May 2021: 10:00-19:00
- Saturday, 29 May 2021: 10:00-19:00
- Sunday, 30 May 2021: 10:00-18:00

At the accreditation pick-up you must provide:

- the “health declaration form”. This document you received with your accreditation confirmation email. Please complete it and bring it with you.
- a copy of the confirmation email and a valid photographic ID (e.g. passport or driving licence) in order to collect your accreditation.

Daily accreditations – all photographers will have daily accreditations which they will have to pick up in the accreditation centre every day. Before picking up the first accreditation, you must send the PCR test results (not older than 48 hrs) to the Hungarian Handball Federation COVID-Officer (Dr. Balazs, Mate – balazs.mate@mksz.hu) in advance (Please put the following into the subject line: ‘Preliminary PCR test result – Orange Zone Acc. – DELO EHF FINAL4’)

Photographers can receive daily accreditation after they have been tested with a quick Antigen test in the testing centre adjacent to the accreditation centre. We kindly ask all media representatives who will be operating in the orange zone to pick up their daily accreditation at least an hour before they want to start working in the arena.

Testing centre opening hours are as follows:

- Saturday, 29 May – 8:30-19:00
- Sunday, 30 May – 8:30-19:00

Media centre – will be open on Saturday and Sunday from 11:00 to 22:30. Media centre will have an info desk, working area and catering area.

I GENERAL MEDIA INFORMATION

Catering – sandwiches, fruits, snacks, coffee, soft drinks and water will be available in the media centre on Saturday and Sunday from 11:00 – 22:30.

Bibs (photographers) – a small deposit (20€/6000 HUF) will be required on arrival from photographers to ensure the return of bibs after the event.

Media seating – all written media will be provided with one working position in the media tribune. You will keep the same seat for the duration of the event.

Parking – there is no dedicate media parking. Media representatives can make us of the garage in the Papp László Budapest Sportaréna (comes with a parking fee)

Photographer courtside positions – due to the high level of demand for photographer places, a match by match ticketing system for courtside places will be used. Priority for courtside positions will go to photographers from those teams competing and major agencies.

Virtual media operations – media calls, mixed zone and post-match press conferences will be done virtually via MS Teams. All accredited media representatives are added to the DELO EHF FINAL4 2021 Team. Make sure you have the MS Teams app installed on your device or that you have logged to the MS Teams via your browser. Direct links to media calls, mixed zone and press conference will follow on Friday.

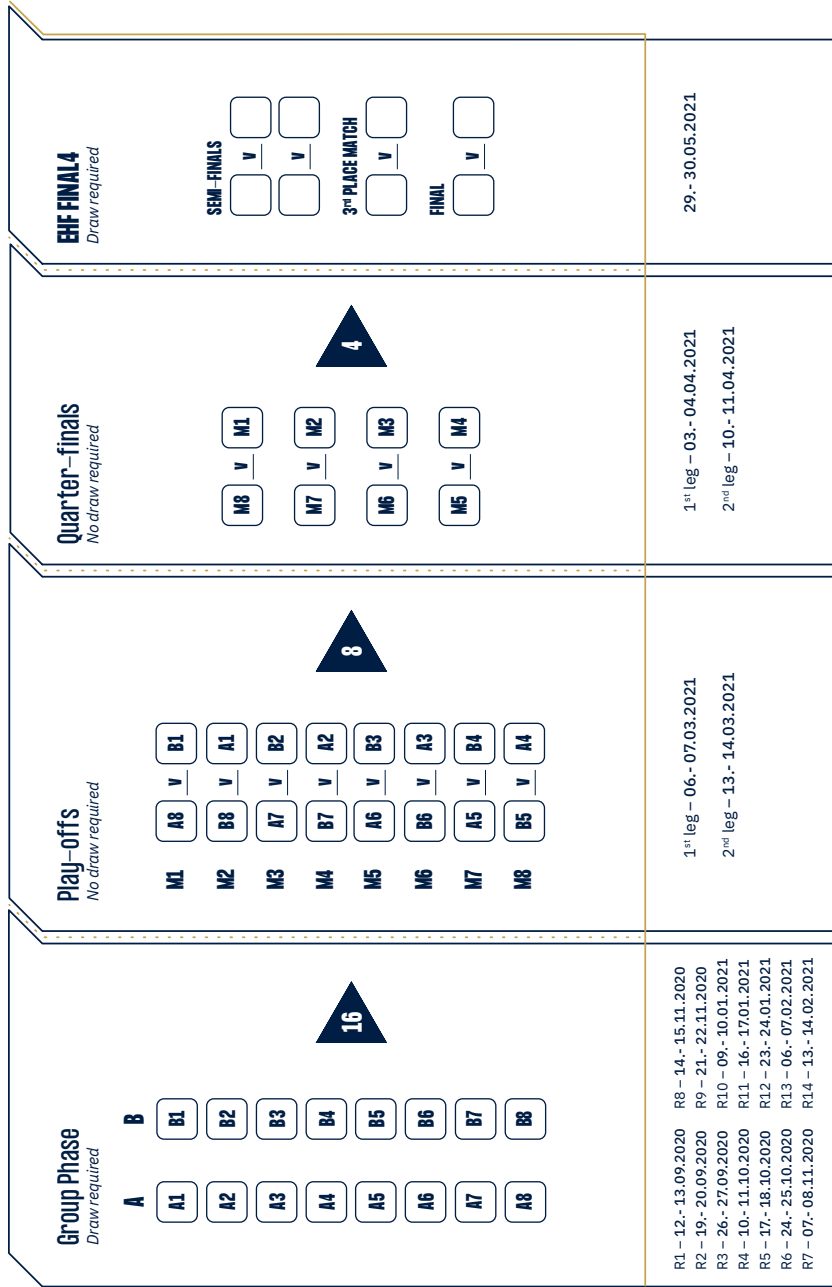

I DELO EHF FINAL4 LINEUP

The four participants were confirmed with the completion of the quarter-final with less than seven weeks to go until the DELO EHF FINAL4 in Budapest. The quartet makes for an interesting blend, including two debutants (Brest and CSKA), one team competing for only the second time (Vipers), and the team that have dominated the competition in recent years (Győr).

CSKA, playing in their first EHF Champions League season, came back from a five-goal defeat in the first leg to eliminate CSM Bucuresti on away goals, 51:51.

Brest came victorious out of the all-French clash with Metz Handball, 60:50, following their decisive 10-goal win in the first leg.

Vipers also did the job in the first leg, as they defeated 2019 finalists Rostov-Don by seven goals in the first part of their double-header in Russia and maintained that difference in the second leg, 57:50.

And Győr were the only team to win both legs of the quarter-final, as they defeated Buducnost 54:40 on aggregate to book their place at the pinnacle event for their fifth participation in a total of six EHF FINAL4 events.

FACTS AND FIGURES: ALL THE NUMBERS YOU NEED TO KNOW AFTER THE QUARTER-FINAL

Four matches are still ahead, 124 have been played: the DELO EHF Champions League 2020/21 has progressed to the semi-final. The draw for the DELO EHF FINAL4 2021, including Győr, Vipers, Brest and CSKA, will take place on Tuesday 13 April at 17:30 CEST in Hungary.

Here are the main facts and figures:

0 times a nation has been represented by two teams at the women's EHF FINAL4 (since 2014); Russia missed the chance this year as Rostov lost in the quarter-final.

1

time Győr failed to qualify for the EHF FINAL4 – in 2015.

1 former CL winner is among the participants: Győr (2013, 2014, 2017, 2018, 2019).

1 team arrives unbeaten at the EHF FINAL4: Győr won 12 times and had four draws in 16 matches this season.

1 coach has participated in the EHF FINAL4 with two different teams: Vipers coach Ole Gustav Gjekstad, who previously took part with Larvik in 2015 and with Vipers in 2019.

1 team won both quarter-final legs: Győr. Vipers and Brest both had a draw in the second leg and CSKA lost in the first leg.

1 quarter-final match included 60 or more goals – Vipers vs Rostov 34:27, raising the total for the season to 25 matches with 60 or more goals.

2 teams are EHF FINAL4 debutants: CSKA, Brest.

2

players can win the sixth CL title of their careers: Anita Görbicz and Eduarda Amorim (both Győr).

2 Vipers players can win their fifth CL title: Katrine Lunde and Nora Mørk, both have won at least two titles with Győr.

3 of the 4 EHF FINAL4 participants advanced from group B (Győr, CSKA and Brest), one from group A (Vipers).

3 different teams only have won the EHF FINAL4 (since 2014): Győr, Buducnost, and CSM.

4 CSKA players were 2016 Olympic gold medallists with Russia: Anna Sedoykina, Marina Sudakova, Ekaterina Ilina and Darya Dmitrieva.

4

former CL top scorers have qualified for the EHF FINAL4 2021: Heidi Løke and Linn Jorum Sulland (Vipers), Anita Görbicz (Győr), Isabelle Gulldén (Brest).

5 goals was the deficit CSKA made up in the second quarter-final leg against CSM; no other team that lost the first leg has made it through.

6 times, including in 2021, Győr have been part of the EHF FINAL4, a record.

7 times, including in 2021, the Papp László

Aréna in Budapest have been the host to the EHF FINAL4.

9 nations have won the CL: Hungary (6 titles), Denmark (6), Austria (4), Montenegro (2), Croatia (1), Spain (1), Slovenia (2), North Macedonia (1), Russia (1), Norway (1), Romania (1).

10

players who won the CL multiple times are part of the EHF FINAL4 2021: six from Győr, four from Vipers.

11 goals marked the biggest winning margin in a quarter-final match, when Győr beat Buducnost 30:19.

12 clubs from five nations have qualified for the EHF FINAL4 in the past and/or this year: Győr (6 times), Vardar (5), Buducnost (4), CSM (3), Rostov (2), Vipers (2), FC Midtjylland, Larvik, Volgograd, Metz, CSKA and Brest (all 1).

15

years in a row, Győr have reached at least the quarter-final; 13 times, including in 2021, they advanced to the semi-final.

15 is the highest number of goals scored by a single player in an EHF FINAL4 match, by Isabelle Gulldén for CSM in the 2016 final against Győr. Gulldén is competing again this year, with Brest.

18 is the highest number of goals scored by a player in the quarter-final, by Grace Zaadi (Rostov); followed by Cristina Neagu (CSM) with 15, and Nora Mørk (Vipers) and Ana Gros (Brest) both with 14 goals

32 points from 18 matches so far this CL season have been gained by Győr; followed by CSKA with 27 points, Brest with 24, and Vipers with 23.

40 is the lowest number of goals scored in total by a team in both quarter-final legs, by Buducnost against Győr.

41 is the lowest amount of goals in a CL match this season, when Buducnost beat FTC 22:19 in a play-off tie; followed by 43 at CSKA vs CSM (24:19) in the quarter-final.

55

matches in a row is the current unbeaten streak from Győr in the CL: 47 wins, 8 draws since a defeat to CSM (28:22) in January 2018.

60 is the highest number of goals scored by a team over both quarter-final legs, by Brest against Metz; followed by Vipers' 57, Győr's 54 and CSKA's 51.

71 is the highest amount of goals in a single CL match this season, when Odense beat Vipers 36:35 in the play-offs.

118

goals in 18 matches give Brest's Ana Gros the lead in the top scorer standings, ahead of CSM's Cristina Neagu (115) and Buducnost's Jovanka Radicevic (94).

413 goals were scored in the eight quarter-final matches, an average of 51.62.

6,799 goals have been scored in the 124 matches played during the 2020/21 season, an average of 54.83 goals per match.

I YOUR VIRTUAL FRONT-RROW SEAT AT THE DELO EHF FINAL4

The elite of European women’s club handball gathers in Budapest this weekend for the DELO EHF FINAL4 2021 – and fans can closely follow all the action on and off the court. Even though only a limited number of spectators can visit the Papp László Sportaréna, all handball fans across the globe will feel like they are sitting in the first row thanks to the extensive online and TV coverage of the competition’s marquee event.

Watch on EHFTV and live TV

The free-to-watch EHFTV platform is where fans, after a one-time registration, will find all four matches of the DELO EHF FINAL4, though geo-restrictions apply in certain regions. The platform is fully adaptable for all devices, whether fans are enjoying the matches at home or catching them on the go on a mobile device. In addition, 28 broadcasters across Europe, Africa, the Americas and Asia will be airing the DELO EHF FINAL4 – an additional seven broadcasters globally from the previous edition in 2019.

- Brest have never beaten Györ in an official match, but have come very close multiple times
- Györ have won the DELO EHF Champions League five times — once before the EHF FINAL4 format was introduced, in 2012/13, and four times at the pinnacle weekend in Budapest, including the last three trophies available. The Hungarian team have played the semi-finals a further seven times
- reaching the DELO EHF FINAL4 is a historic achievement for Brest, as the French club have never contested the semi-finals. Their best result in the DELO EHF Champions League was the quarter-finals in 2019/20 before the competition was halted due to Covid-19
- Györ take the court with a 55-game unbeaten run behind them, stretching back to January 2018 when they lost to CSM Bucuresti
- Brest's Ana Gros will almost certainly claim the season's top scorer crown. The Slovenian right back enters the DELO EHF FINAL4 with 118 goals, 35 goals clear of her nearest rival still in the competition
- Györ's top scorer coming into the DELO EHF FINAL4 is Veronica Kristiansen, with 83 goals. She is closely followed by two other backs for the Hungarian side: Estelle Nze Minko, with 79 goals, and Stine Oftedal, with 76
- Györ changed coach only weeks out from the DELO EHF FINAL4 following a shock loss to FTC in the Hungarian league. Ambros Martin, who guided the club to four of their five titles, returned early and will lead the side on the final weekend
- Brest will farewell coach Laurent Bezeau after this season, following eight years with him at the helm
- Brest back Gros will leave Brest for CSKA over the summer, while Györ back Eduarda Amorim will transfer to Rostov-Don. Györ legend Anita Görbicz is set to end her career after this season, as the only player to have passed the 1,000-goal mark in the EHF Champions League
- the only absence due to injury from the squads in this clash will be Brest back Kalidiatou Niakate. Fellow Brest back Monika Kobylinska returned to the team in May after a seven-month absence

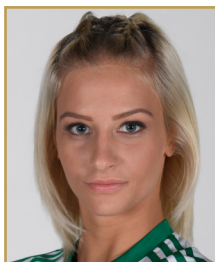

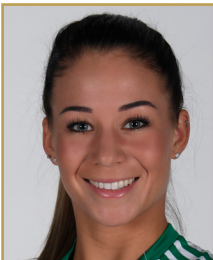

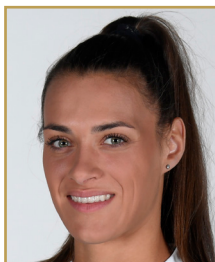

- it is the second DELO EHF FINAL4 participation for Vipers, who reached the 2019 edition and ranked third after defeating Metz in the 3/4 placement match
- CSKA are playing not only their first CL season, but their first ever international competition. The club's women's handball team was formed in 2019
- for Vipers, it is the fourth season in the top flight and the ninth year overall in Europe
- CSKA played the regular season in group B alongside Győr and Brest, placing second with 23 points — just one behind Győr — following 11 wins, one draw and two defeats. They started the season with an attention-grabbing draw versus the Hungarian side
- Vipers were the only DELO EHF FINAL4 participants in group A, where a fifth-place ranking was enough to see them through to the play-offs. The Norwegian team earned 16 points following seven wins, two draws and five losses (including three assessed results)
- in 2019/20, Vipers' campaign ended in the main round on the back of their semi-final success the previous season
- CSKA were the only team to turn a first-leg quarter-final loss around to clinch the DELO EHF FINAL4 ticket, defeating CSM Bucuresti based on more goals scored away. They also lost the first leg in the play-offs, before beating Krim in the return fixture to proceed
- Vipers eliminated another Russian side, Rostov-Don, in the quarter-finals, despite playing both legs away with spectators supporting their rivals. In the play-offs, they knocked Odense out of the competition
- alongside Győr, Vipers is the only other team at the DELO EHF FINAL4 to count past title winners in their squad — Heidi Løke, Nora Mørk, Katrine Lunde, Linn Jorum Sulland and Jana Knedlikova
- Sulland was the top scorer of the last full season of the CL, with 89 goals
- both sides are led by centre backs as their top scorers in 2020/21, with Henny Ella Reistad first for Vipers with 66 goals and Ekaterina Ilina on top for CSKA with 67
- CSKA changed coach after the Champions League play-offs, with Jan Leslie replaced by his former assistant, 2016 Olympic gold medallist Olga Akopian
- in terms of injuries, CSKA left back Elena Mikhaylichenko, who ruptured a ligament in November, has recently returned but was back on court only to shoot penalties in the final stage of the domestic league

I IMPORTANT REGULATIONS

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN TWO OR MORE TEAMS HAVE THE SAME NUMBER OF POINTS

All matches of the DELO EHF FINAL4 shall be played in 2 x 30 minutes with a half-time break of 15 mins.

If a Semi-final match or the Final (place 1/2) ends in a draw, there will be a five minutes break followed by one extra time of 2 x 5 minutes, there will be a one minute half-time break at half-time for the changeover of teams.

If the placement match 3/4 ends in a draw, there shall be no extra time, the match will be decided directly by penalty throws.

If penalty throws are needed to decide the match, the procedure is as follows:

- Prior to the penalty throws, each team shall name five players eligible to play at the end of the match by handing the referees a list of numbers. These players shall then take one throw each, alternating with their opponents. Each team is free to determine the sequence in which throwers will take their throws.

- The goalkeepers may be freely selected from the match report and exchanged in accordance with the Rules of the Game. Goalkeepers may take throws and throwers may perform as goalkeepers.

- At the Technical Meeting the teams will be informed at which goal the penalty throws will be taken. The team taking the first penalty throw shall be determined by the referees by drawing lots. The team winning the draw may choose whether it wishes to throw first or last.

- If the scores are equal after the first round of penalty throws, it shall be continued until a decision is reached. In the second round, the other team shall start. Again five players shall be named who are eligible to play (the players named before may be named once again).

- In the second round, a decision is reached when a goal difference arises after both teams have taken one throw each.

- Eligible players are players entered in the match report that have not been disqualified or suspended at the time of the final whistle.

- Serious infractions committed during penalty throws shall be sanctioned by disqualification. If a thrower is disqualified or suffers an injury, an eligible substitute player shall be supplementary named.

- While the throws are being taken, only the player taking the throw, the current goalkeeper and the referees may enter the respective half of the playing court.

- If the number of eligible players falls below five, players may be named to take a second throw in the same round.

I DELO EHF FINAL4 COUNTS DOWN TO ITS NEW EDITION

The DELO EHF FINAL4 is the culmination of the women European club handball season. The two-day event sees the best four teams in Europe playing to decide the ultimate winner of the DELO EHF Champions League.

Due to the Covid-19 pandemic the previous edition in 2020 had to be called off but the whole handball world witness now how the highlight event returns back in all its glamour on 29/30 May 2021. Introduced in the 2013/14 season and to be played until at least 2024 in Budapest, the decision to follow the format of the men's version of the competition and create a tournament for the final phase was seen as crucial for the growth of women's handball across Europe. The aim was to create a flagship event, one that could compete on the international sports market and make Europe's leading club competition even more attractive to fans, partners and sponsors.

The success of all previous editions of the EHF FINAL4 up to date showed that this format has been the right strategy. It has set new standards in organisation and entertainment; it

is not just four games played over two days but a true entertainment event. To little surprise the DELO WOMEN'S EHF FINAL4 2019 was the season's highlight in European handball as nearly 25,000 spectators in the Budapest Papp Lászl Sportarena and millions of fans at home watched four unforgettable handball games, unique entertainment shows and how Györi Audi ETO KC were crowned the champions for the fifth time.

The success of the DELO EHF FINAL4 is also thanks to the commitment of a great number of volunteers who have been active on the weekend of the event.

I NUMBERS FROM PREVIOUS YEARS OF THE SPECTACLE IN BUDAPEST

FACTS AND FIGURES FROM THE PAST EDITIONS

15 goals by Isabella Gullden in a single match, 57 overall strikes by Nycke Groot, five participations of Györ, three different winners in the last seven years and 1,254 goals scored so far – this is what you need to know from the previous six editions of the EHF FINAL4 in Budapest before the start of the 2020/21 season.

1

in contrast to the EHF FINAL4 in Cologne where the number is still zero - Györ had defended the title in Budapest, and even made it a hat-trick (2017, 2018 and 2019).

1 club - again Györ - won the DELO EHF FINAL4 four times (2014, 2017, 2018, 2019).

1 player has won the EHF FINAL4 with two

different clubs: Katarina Bulatovic (2014 with Györ, 2015 with Buducnost) - she was also the first player in the EHF FINAL4 history to defend the title.

1 player - again Bulatovic - was part of the FINAL4 with three different clubs: Buducnost, Györ and Rostov.

1 time - in the 2017 edition - all four participants were the same as in the previous year: Györ, Vardar, Bucuresti and Buducnost.

1 match in the history of the EHF FINAL4 in Budapest - the 2016 final CSM Bucuresti vs Györ (29:26) - needed to be decided in penalty shoot-out after extra-time, with the happy end for the Romanian side.

2 countries were represented by two different clubs so far: Russia (Dinamo/2015 and Rostov/2018 and 2019) and Norway (Larvik/2015 and Vipers/2019)

2 more matches - the 2017 and 2018 finals Győr vs. Vardar - needed to be decided in extra-time, and the winners were Győr twice. **1** VELUX EHF FINAL4 final needed to be decided by a penalty shootout: The 2016 edition of Kielce vs Veszprém (39:38)

2

EHF Champions League debutants made it to Budapest in their first ever CL seasons: Vardar (2014) and CSM Bucuresti (2016)

2 times - in 2017 and 2018 - the final was composed by the same teams: Győr vs Vardar.

3 players - Anita Görbicz, Eduarda Amorim and Bernadett Bodi were part of the Győr squad at all four EHF FINAL4 triumphs, Görbicz and Amorim are even five-times Champions League winners - and aim for their sixth trophy in the new season.

3 countries were represented by the six FINAL4 winners so far: Hungary (4), Montenegro and Romania.

10

different clubs were part of the six EHF FINAL4 events: Vardar/5 times), Győr (5 times), Buducnost (4), Bucuresti (3), Rostov (2), Midtjylland, Volgograd, Larvik, Metz and Kristiansand (each once).

4 times goalkeepers were awarded Most Valuable Players of the FINAL4 - three of them played for the respective winners: Clara Woltering (Buducnost/2015), Jelena Grubisic (Bucuresti/2016) and Kari Grimsbö (Győr/2019), while Amandine Leynaud (Vardar) lost the final in 2018.

6 which means all - times, the Papp Laszlo Arena was the venue of the DELO Women's EHF FINAL4. The contract with the arena located in Budapest lasts until 2024.

8 different nations were part of the six EHF FINAL4 events in Budapest: Hungary, Russia, North Macedonia, Romania, Montenegro, Denmark, France and Norway.

10 goals was the biggest gap in any EHF FINAL4 match, when Buducnost beat Vardar in the 2015 semi-final 27:17 - ahead of the 2019 semi-final Győr vs Vipers (31:22).

15 goals by Isabelle Gullden (Bucuresti) are the high score of one player in a single match.

20 goals by Nycke Groot (Midtjylland) are the high score of an individual player at one FINAL4 tournament (2014), in 2018, Groot scored in total 16 goals for Győr.

41 goals was the lowest ever score in an EHF FINAL4 match, when Győr beat Buducnost 21:20 in the 2016 semi-final, followed by 42 goals of the 2014 semi of Buducnost vs Vardar (22:20) and 46 in the 2018 semi Vardar vs Rostov (25:19).

57 goals were scored by Nycke Groot (Midtjylland/Győr) to be all-time top scorer of the EHF FINAL4 events, the Dutch (now playing for Odense) is one goal ahead of Cristina Neagu (Bucuresti/56).

61

61 goals were the high-score in a final so far, when Győr beat Vardar 31:30 after extra-time.

71 goals was the biggest score in a Women's EHF FINAL match, when Vardar beat Bucuresti in the 2017 semi-final 38:31.

224 was the highest overall number of goals in a Women's EHF FINAL4 so far - at the 2017 edition. Second ranked is the 2019 edition by 215 goals, ahead of 210 goals in 2014, 204 in 2018, 202 in 2016 and the low score of 199 in 2015.

I NEW DESIGN FOR THE WINNERS' TROPHY

The new ultimate prize for Europe's elite handball clubs has been revealed on the fringes of the start of 2020/21 season. One design has emerged from 27 submissions across 12 European nations to become the new EHF Champions League trophy.

With a new era of European handball on the horizon, EHF Marketing launched a public tender with the goal of finding the best possible new trophy design for the EHF Champions League. During this process, a total of 27 designs were received from companies and artists in 12 countries, making it a truly European competition. The new trophies have been created in accordance with the new brand guidelines. The winning agency was [Sustain Awards](#) by [Oiko Design Office](#), a Spanish agency based in Barcelona, specialising in the design and production of environmentally responsible trophies.

The core idea of the trophy was to represent a goal as the main objective of the sport, to reflect the dynamic movement of a ball hitting the target and to transmit handball as a team sport by forming the net in the shape of a shield. The net itself symbolises the needed connection within a team - all for one and one for all.

For the first time, the design is the same for both men's and women's competitions and every element from the font to the logo fits the new competition identity. The materials of which the trophies consist of are aluminium cast (30% recycled aluminium) for the body and base, and recycled balls used for the sculptural ball which hits the net. A golden bath covers the trophies, making sure they are in line with the new brand image, giving them the premium touch that all trophies need. The sustainability of the materials has been a key element in the choice of the winning design. The trophies are each 80 cm high, 57 cm wide and weigh 10 kg.

They were both part of all Champions League titles with Audi ETO Győr, now Eduarda Amorim Taleska and Anita Görbicz aim for the record number of six trophies in this competition in their last international match for Győr. Görbicz will end her career and take over a new function in the club, while Amorim Taleska will join Rostov.

Only Austra Fridrikas and Bojana Popovic have won the EHF Champions League six times so far. The three Norwegians Katrine Lunde, Heidi Løke and Nora Mørk, all teammates at Vipers now, are below Amorim and Görbicz, with four trophies each - and might face them on Sunday in the final.
