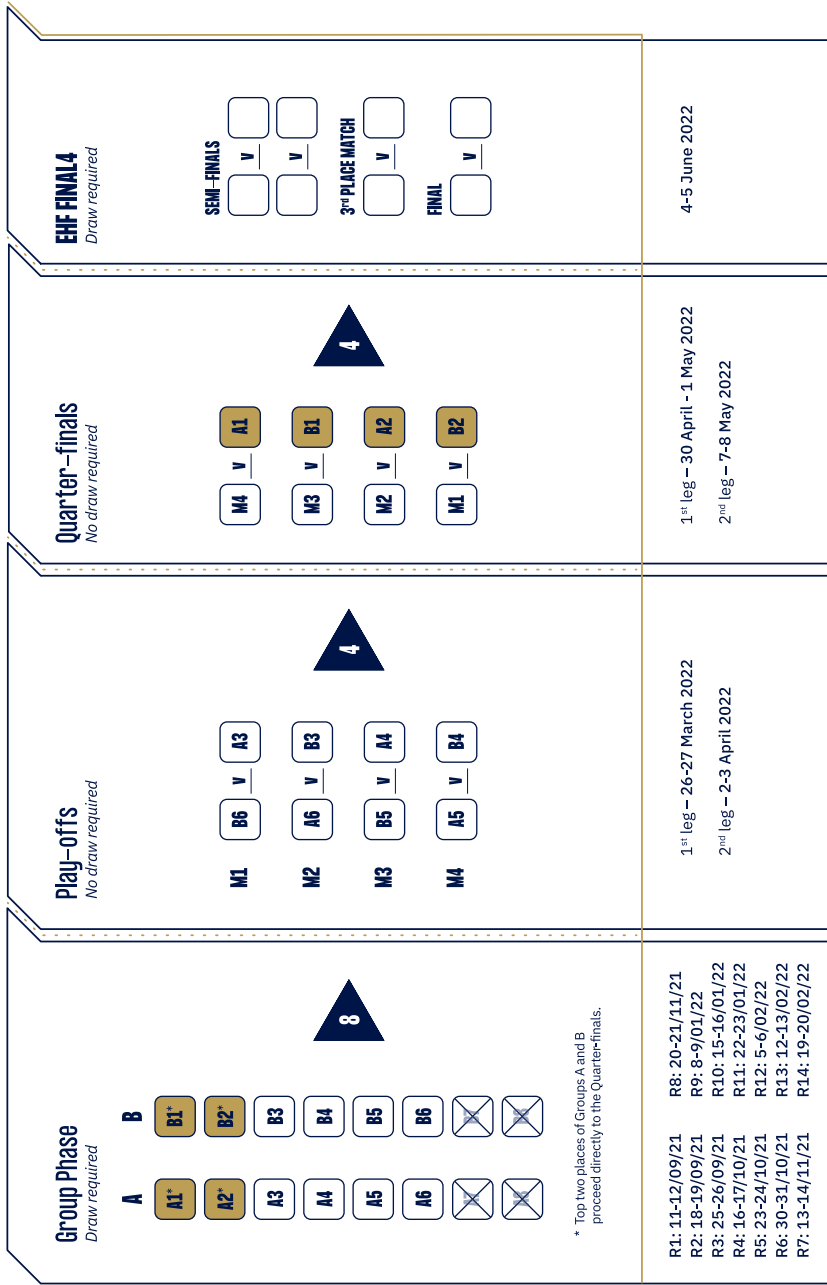

FACTS AND FIGURES: ALL THE NUMBERS YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE THE PLAY-OFFS

With the group phase of the EHF Champions League Women 2021/22 completed, it is time to shift our focus to the knockout phase of Europe's top-level women's club competition. The play-offs are coming up next, so here is an overview of the most interesting numbers and stats of the 2021/22 season so far.

0 teams have been part of all seven EHF FINAL4 events so far; record winners Győr lead the way with six appearances.

0 teams from the same country face in the play-offs; one national derby is possible in the quarter-final – if FTC beat Krim in their play-off, they will next meet fellow Hungarian side Győr.

1

play-off pairing is identical to a play-off pairing from last season: Dortmund vs Metz.

1 team managed to win the EHF FINAL4 two (or more) times in a row: Győr, who lifted the trophy in 2017, 2018, and 2019.

2 former CL winners haven't advanced from the group phase: Buducnost and Podravka.

3 players aim for their sixth CL trophy: Katrine Lunde, Heidi Løke, and Nora Mørk (all Vipers).

4 former CL winners, including all winners since 2016, are part of the knockout phase: Krim (play-offs), Győr, CSM, and Vipers (quarter-finals).

4 countries were represented by the seven EHF FINAL4 winners so far: Hungary (4), Montenegro, Romania, and Norway.

4 teams from four countries have qualified directly for the quarter-finals: group winners Esbjerg (DEN) and Győr (HUN), and runners-ups CSM (ROU) and Vipers (NOR).

4 World Players of the Year, combining eight awards, are part of the knockout phase: Cristina Neagu (CSM/2010, 2015, 2016, 2018), Andrea Lekic (Krim/2013), Heidi Løke (Vipers/2011), and Stine Oftedal (Győr/2019).

5

of the 10 teams still in the competition have played at EHF FINAL4 before: Brest, CSM, Győr, Metz, and Vipers.

5 of the eight quarter-finalists from 2020/21 are also part of the knockout phase this season: Brest, CSM, Győr, Metz, and Vipers.

7 countries are represented in the knockout phase: Denmark, France, Hungary (with two teams each), Germany, Norway, Romania, and Slovenia (with one team each).

8 of the 112 group matches ended in a draw: five in group A, three in group B; Esbjerg and FTC both had three draws – once against each other.

11 matches in the group phase ended with fewer than 45 goals.

11 different nations are represented by the 27 CL winners so far: Denmark, Hungary (6 titles each), Austria (4), Montenegro, Norway, Slovenia (2 each), Croatia, North Macedonia, Romania, Russia, and Spain (1 each).

12 clubs have played at the EHF FINAL4 so far: Győr (6 times), Vardar (5), Buducnost (4), CSM (3), Rostov, Vipers, Metz (2 each), Midtjylland, Volgograd, Larvik, CSKA, and Brest (1 each).

23

group phase matches ended with a winning margin of 10 or more goals.

24 goals was the biggest winning margin in a group phase match, when Dortmund beat Podravka 38:14.

26

is the highest number of points a team gathered in the group phase: Györ, who won 13 of their 14 matches.

26 was the highest number of points a team gathered in the group phase: Györ, who won 13 of their 14 matches.

29 group phase matches had 60 or more goals.

39 was the lowest number of goals in a group phase match, when FTC defeated Rostov 20:19.

46 of the 112 group phase matches were won by the visiting team.

58 of the 112 group phase matches were won by the home team: 31 in group A; 27 in group B.

69 was the highest amount of goals in a group phase match, and it happened twice: each time involving Metz, who lost 39:30 against Györ and defeated Odense 38:31.

94

goals give CSM's Cristina Neagu the lead in the CL top scorers ranking after the group phase.

+117 was the best overall goal difference for a team – Györ – in the group phase.

471 goals were scored by Györ, an average of 33.6 goals per match, more than any other team in the group phase.

6,079 goals were scored in the group phase: 2,971 in group A; 3,108 in group B.

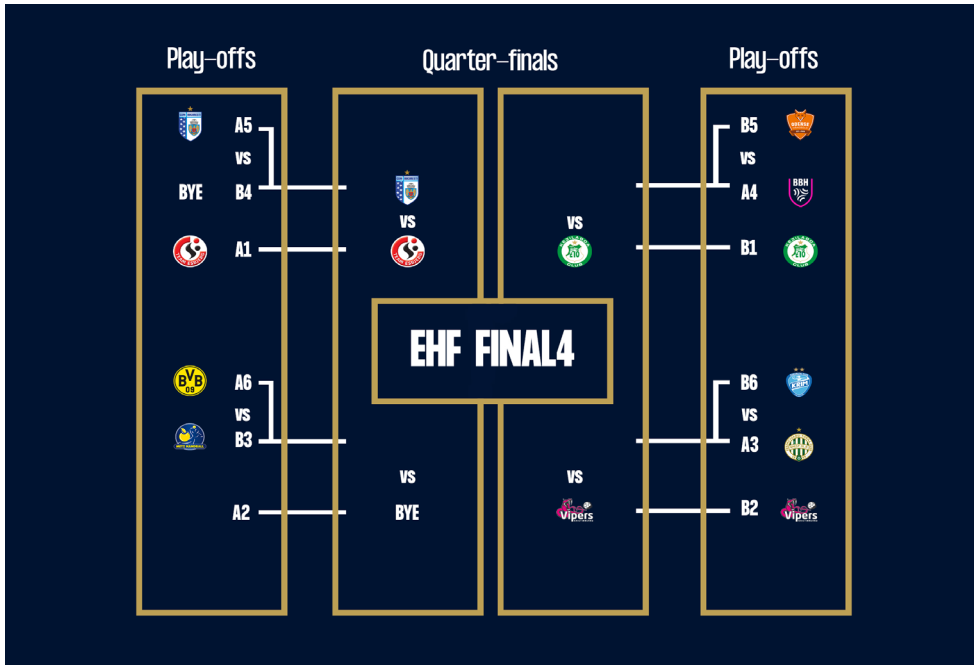

ROAD TO THE EHF FINAL4 WOMEN 2022



Due to the war situation in Ukraine, all Russian and Belarusian clubs competing in European handball competitions have been suspended until further notice by the EHF Executive Committee on 28 February 2022.

In the EHF Champions League Women 2021/22, this measure involves Rostov-Don and CSKA, who finished second in group A and fourth in group B, respectively.

CSM Bucuresti, who finished fifth in group A and were set to take on CSKA in the play-offs, have received a bye into the quarter-final, where they will meet Team Esbjerg.

Also, the winners of the play-off tie between BV Borussia 09 Dortmund and Metz Handball would have played Rostov in the quarter-final but will now qualify directly for the EHF FINAL4 Women 2022 in Budapest on 4/5 June.

I IMPORTANT REGULATIONS

WHAT HAPPENS WHEN TWO TEAMS HAVE THE SAME NUMBER OF POINTS?

All matches of the EHF Champions League Women shall be played in 2 x 30 minutes with a half-time break of 15 minutes.

The matches shall be scored as follows:

- a) win = 2 points
- b) draw = 1 point
- c) loss = 0 points

PLAY-OFFS AND QUARTER-FINALS

If, after completion of the two matches, both teams have won the same number of points, no extra time will be played. The team advancing shall be determined by the following criteria:

- a) larger goal difference
- b) higher number of goals scored in the away match
- c) penalty throws

RULES FOR EXECUTION OF PENALTY THROWS

- Prior to penalty throwing, each team shall name five players eligible to play at the end of the match by handing the referees a list of numbers. These players shall then take one throw each until a decision (a winner) is reached, alternating with their opponents. Each team is free to determine the sequence in which throwers will take their throws

- The goalkeepers may be freely selected from the match report and exchanged in accordance with the Rules of the game. Goalkeepers may take throws and throwers may play as goalkeepers.

- The referees shall choose the goal at which throws are taken. The team taking the first penalty throw shall be determined by the referees by drawing lots. The team winning the draw may choose whether it wishes to throw first or last.

- If scores are equal after the first round of penalty throwing, it shall be continued until a decision is reached. In the second round, the other team shall start. Again five players shall be named who are eligible to play (the players named before may be named once again).

- In the second round, a decision (a winner) is reached when a goal difference arises after both teams have taken one throw each.

- Eligible players are players entered in the match report who have not been disqualified or suspended at the time of the final whistle.

- Serious infractions committed during penalty throwing shall be sanctioned by disqualification. If a thrower is disqualified or suffers an injury, an eligible substitute player shall be named supplementary.

- While the throws are being taken, only the player taking the throw, the current goalkeeper and the referees may enter the respective half of the playing area.

- If the number of eligible players falls below five, players may be named to take a second throw in the same round.

I KRIM MERCATOR LJUBLJANA VS FTC–RAIL CARGO HUNGARIA

- playing in their 27th straight CL season, Krim aim for a first quarter-final berth in 15 years
- Krim, CL winners in 2001 and 2003, finished group B in sixth position, with 10 points, and only secured their play-off spot in the last group match against Sävehof
- Krim won three of their four matches against FTC in the 1990s, but have not beaten their Hungarian opponents since 2013 and lost all four matches in recent seasons
- former Krim player Nataliya Derepasko, a three-time CL top scorer, took over as head coach from Uros Bregar in October 2021
- right wing Katarina Krpez-Slezak was Krim's leading scorer in the group phase with 66 goals, just ahead of Tjaša Stanko with 64
- Krim will be vastly reinforced with the mid-season arrival of Ana Gros; the Slovenian international and CL 2020/21 top scorer has left CSKA in March and joined Krim
- FTC, playing in their 22th CL season, finished third in group A and only just missed out on direct qualification for the quarter-finals
- FTC finished on 19 points; they gained most points (12) at home, where they remained unbeaten with five wins and two draws
- the last time the two teams met, in a group phase match in Ljubljana in November 2020, FTC beat Krim 32:26
- FTC are trying to reach the EHF FINAL4 in their home town Budapest for the first time
- long-standing head coach Gabor Elek is in his 15th season at the helm of FTC
- Angela Malestein is FTC's CL top scorer so far with 70 goals; the Dutch right wing netted 10 goals in a single match twice in the group phase – against Esbjerg and Brest
- French line player Béatrice Edwige, who played for Győr in the past, has joined FTC for the knockout phase after leaving Rostov

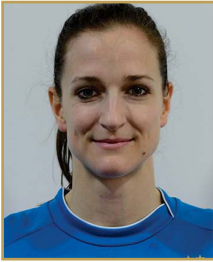

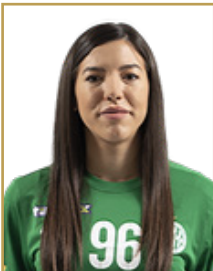

- team captain Alina Grijseels missed four matches due to injury but the centre back is still the top scorer of the team, with 72 goals in the 10 matches she played

- after the group phase, Metz have welcomed back Grace Zaadi; the centre back, who scored 76 times for Rostov-Don this season, left the club in 2020 but will make her comeback at Metz after nearly two years
